
Manifesto for Tomorrow's Global Business





World Population (in Billions): 1950-2050





Millennium Development Goals

J.

- Income poverty: Over 2 billion people live on less than \$2/day
- Energy poverty:
 1.6 billion people today without access to electricity
- Mobility poverty: 900 million people without access to transport
- Sanitation poverty:

2.5 billion people without access to hygienic sanitation

• Water poverty:

1.8 million deaths per year due to lack of sanitation, poor hygiene and unsafe drinking water.

- Agricultural supply chain opportunities (cocoa, corn, dairy products, furniture makers, fishing) in Ecuador
- Low-income housing (target: 40'000 homes in Honduras and Nicaragua)
- Coffee (Peru and Honduras)
- Microinsurance & mobile banking (Bolivia)
- Biofuels, LPG for vehicles and biodigesters (region-wide)
- Recycling (El Salvador)
- Commercial forestry (Bolivia)






People Without Access to Electricity 1.6 Billion








Cumulative Investment in Energy-Supply Infrastructure, 2006-2030

Global emissions scenarios






A Low Carbon Economy – A transformational challenge for society

- A society that emits 50% less GHG emissions by 2050 will look very different
- Major impacts on lifestyles, consumption patterns and infrastructures are likely
- The transformation will not be easy There will be winners and losers
- The current economic crisis and stimulus packages in the US and G20 represent an opportunity for influencing the economy toward a low carbon future
- Consequences for Business
 - Tremendous growth opportunity as supplier of infrastructure, products and services for a growing and more wealthy population - primarily in developing countries




